
Sardi's Professional Luncheon - Tuesday, July 25, 11:00 am





According to the National Survey on Student Engagement, getting students engaged on campus leads to better educational outcomes. That means better learning, higher retention rates, and greater student satisfaction. Retention is a large part of the engagement quotient.
